The Faith & Justice Committee Lunch and Speaker Series, *In My Backyard: Faith and Current Events*, will present a video recording of a Trinity Institute presentation by attorney Bryan Stevenson, author of *Just Mercy*, Executive Director of the Equal Justice Initiative and professor of law at New York University School of Law. In the United States each year, approximately 2,570 children as young as 13 are sentenced to life in prison without parole, and more than 2.7 million children have an incarcerated parent, including one in nine African-American children. Stevenson will focus on the impact of incarceration on young people whose parents or who themselves are incarcerated. Bring your own lunch. Beverages will be provided.

The Wednesday Supper Series

Looking Through the Lens of the Cross

Wednesday, February 17, 24, March 2, 9 and 16 Colhoun A

A series of five Wednesday night parish gatherings for supper and a program will be held in Colhoun A during Lent. Supper for the whole family will be from 5:30 to 6:15 p.m. Programs will be presented from 6:15 to 7:00 p.m. The cost for supper will be \$7 for adults and \$5 for children younger than 12, with a maximum cost per family of \$20. After supper, child care for children four years old and younger will be available in room 107 off the Preschool hallway, and craft-making activities will be offered for Pre-K students through fifth graders in Colhoun B and C.

The five-part program series, *Looking Through the Lens of the Cross,* will be led by St. Paul's clergy and guest speakers. We all know that Jesus died on the cross for the sins of the world, so now what? Well, as it turns out, a lot. The cross of Christ changed everything, and for our Lenten supper series, we will explore some of what that change means for how we see the world and our everyday life with God and the issues of power, strength, service, suffering and change when seen through the lens of the cross. *Looking through the Cross*, the Archbishop of Canterbury's Lent Book for 2014 by Graham Tomlin, is recommended as background reading.

Wednesday Holy Eucharist

As usual, a service of Holy Eucharist will be offered each Wednesday at 10:30 a.m. at the side altar in the nave and at 5:30 p.m. in the chapel.

The Stations of the Cross

Parishioners may walk the Stations of the Cross in the nave and chapel during church office hours throughout Lent. Booklets containing the liturgy will be available.

The Labyrinth

The Labyrinth will be open all day on Wednesdays during Lent, with a special emphasis on the time from 4:15 to 5:15 p.m., right before the 5:30 Eucharist in the chapel. Based on the labyrinth in the floor of Chartres Cathedral in France, St. Paul's Labyrinth is etched into the floor of the chapel, a balanced, circular walking path with seven concentric circles, leading from an outer entry point to the center. As a true labyrinth, it offers a single, purposeful pathway, with no dead ends, and can be walked by people of all faiths. Some people pray as they walk, opening their minds and hearts to God's peace and the presence of the Holy Spirit, while others meditate, as they follow the path to the center and back out again into the world.

Spring Formation Classes

The Rector's Forum *A Christian Response to Terrorism* April 3, 17 and 24, May 1, 8, 15 and 22 in Colhoun A The Rev. D. Dixon Kinser

Hebrews 13:8 boldly proclaims that, "Jesus Christ is same, yesterday, today, and forever," yet we read that verse in a world where, "9/11 has changed everything." How do we hold these two realities together? This very tension provides the guiding dynamic of this seven-part class on what a uniquely Christian response to terrorism looks like. During each session, the Rev. D. Dixon Kinser will provide space to explore and discuss topics like Christians and fear, Christians and evil, Christians and just war, etc., that will provide some guidance for how Christian people live in a post-9/11 world.



Listen for a Change

Trinity Institute Video Teleconference Friday, February 26, 7:00 to 9:00 p.m. Saturday, February 27, 8:30 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. Colhoun A

St. Paul's will serve as a remote partner site for Trinity Institute's 45th National Theological Conference, sponsored by Trinity Wall Street, an Episcopal parish in New York City. This year's theme is, "Listen for a Change: Sacred Conversations for Racial Justice." Trinity's three-day conference, which will take place in January, will be adapted by the Faith & Justice Committee as a more focused, condensed program to be presented at St. Paul's on Friday evening, February 26, and all day Saturday, February 27.

In today's society, many systems of racial discrimination thrive because they remain invisible. As children of God, we are called to wake up, and to listen up. People of faith know the power of truth-telling: speaking truth not only to those in positions of power, but first to ourselves.

"Listen for a Change" presents conversation as a learning opportunity: a chance to engage in deep listening and truth-telling and, as a result, develop the skills to create change within a troubled system. By having these difficult conversations, we can build the underlying skills and willingness to address the racial tensions of our time.

After viewing talks by featured speakers, including *New York Times* columnist Nicholas Kristof, actor, playwright and professor Anna Deavere Smith, the Dean of Vanderbilt Divinity School Emilie Townes, NPR journalist Michele Norris and Presiding Bishop, the Most Rev. Michael B. Curry, participants will break into small groups designed and facilitated to continue the conversation with peers, practicing the kinds of transformative conversations that may be carried into community contexts.

This event is open to the public. Advance registration will be required and admission will be charged to cover the cost of food and materials.
