A Focus on Racial Justice

For its entire 2015-16 In My Backyard: Faith and Current Events speaker series, St. Paul's Faith & Justice Committee focused on a single issue: racial justice. In the following interview, Committee Chair Jocelyn Connors explains why and suggests action steps parishioners may take in response to the series.

For the first two years of the speaker series, Faith & Justice presented a variety of topics. This year, you have focused exclusively on racial justice. Why?

Racial justice is in the forefront of the most pressing issues our country is presently facing, and it is a tremendous challenge. Our new Presiding Bishop has named it as a focus of his ministry. The concern of our committee was raised when someone asked. "What about the relationship between the African American community and the police here in Winston-Salem?" Our first speakers this season addressed that question, and the response from the committee and those attending was unanimous: We all wanted to continue this important conversation.

Your committee organized the February "Listen for a Change" event featuring programming from this year's Trinity Institute. Is it just a happy coincidence that their conference this year was focused on the same issue?

In many ways, yes! But I think it was more than that. Dixon, Darby and one of our committee members, Susan Dobyns, had read about "Listen for a Change," and they brought the information to our committee. Our adopting the task of bringing the conference to St. Paul's was an act of Grace.

What have you learned from all the programs presented so far this year? How have you changed as a result of attending?

We learned that there are so many people in our community who are concerned about the issue of racial justice, who want to have serious conversations about it, and who feel empowered by having it take place in an environment like St. Paul's. People were there to listen and learn, and we were told over and over again how much this meant to them. I have personally changed because I have gained a new understanding of the plight of people who have been marginalized by race. Listening to our speakers and participating in the conference

discussions was a liberating experience, and I have been motivated to use the teachings of Christ as I understand them in my daily life and interactions with others.

What impact do you hope these programs will have on St. Paul's parishioners individually and on the church as a whole?

If these programs have served to educate, enlighten and move our parishioners to seek reconciliation and peace with all people in our community and the world, then the mission of the Faith and Justice Committee has been fulfilled. This would have us step out of our "comfort zones"

as we accept Bishop Curry's call to join the "Jesus Movement."

What now is the call to action for the parishioners of St. Paul's?

At this point, we should all prayerfully examine our own lives, "listen for a change," and discern the ways we are being called to serve. That may be as an Augustine or Kids' Café tutor, a worker for Habitat, a driver for Meals on Wheels, or myriad other volunteer opportunities that bring us into the community. We can make a conscious effort to widen our circle of friends, to read and study as much as we can on the issue, and to stand up for justice, fairness and peace.

Upcoming Senior Trips



St. Paul's Senior Adults visited Charleston, South Carolina, for three days in October 2014. A highlight of the trip was dining at The Water's Edge on Shem Creek.

Among the most popular offerings of St. Paul's Senior Adults Ministry are day trips and overnight excursions. "We do our best to plan trips that are interesting, entertaining and fun," said Senior Adults Minister Anne Rahn. "As I'm sure any of our regulars will tell you, senior trips are not just about enjoying an outing. They're a wonderful way to get to know people and develop close friendships within our church family."

The Senior Adults Ministry is planning a day trip to Salisbury on Friday, April 22. The morning will begin with a tour of historic Salisbury by trolley, led by a docent. Dr. Mark Ardrey-Graves, Director of Music Ministry at St. Luke's Episcopal Church and husband of St. Paul's Associate Rector the Rev. Sara C. Ardrey-Graves, will join the group for lunch at Emma's of Salisbury. After lunch Mark will lead a tour of St. Luke's. The bus will leave at 8:00 a.m. and is expected to return by 4:00 p.m. The cost, is \$35 per person.

On Sunday, May 1, Senior Adults will attend a Twin City Stage production of *The Wizard* of Oz. The bus will leave the

upper lot at 1:30 p.m. Tickets are \$25 per person.

On Tuesday, May 24, Senior Adults will travel to Critz, Virginia, to visit the Reynolds Homestead, the boyhood home of R.J. Reynolds. Built in 1843 by R. J. Reynold's father, the Homestead has been designated a State and National Historic Landmark. After touring the home and grounds, the group will eat lunch at Stuart Family Restaurant in Stuart, Virginia. The bus will leave at 9:15 a.m. The cost is \$10 per person, not including lunch.

Planning for three more senior trips is currently underway. On Sunday, June 12, seniors will see "Letters from Home" at the Willingham Theater in Yadkinville. On Wednesday and Thursday, August 3 and 4, seniors will visit Blowing Rock. And St. Paul's seniors will visit Kanuga and the surrounding area on Wednesday and Thursday, October 19 and 20.
